

Suspicious activity is anything that looks like it could be connected with criminal behavior—someone casing a neighborhood, forcing open a door, grabbing a child, screaming, pounding or strong chemical odors coming from a residence. If the activity appears to be threatening to property or people, IMMEDIATELY report the suspicious activity by calling 911. Time is critical in apprehending criminals. It is better to be overly-suspicious than to let a criminal get away.

Neighborhood Watch

Don't you think it's time to join the Neighborhood WATCH?

With as much crime that has been happening in our community we need EVERYONE to step up to the plate and take some action!

The Neighborhood Watch Program is a successful effort that has been in effect for over thirty years in towns, cities and rural areas across the country. Based on the concept of cooperation, neighborhood watch programs bring together law enforcement, city officials and residents and ask them to work together to provide protection for their homes and communities. Crimes such as burglary, vandalism and mischief threaten every member of each community in Arizona and crime watch efforts such as The Neighborhood Watch Program help discourage this type of activity. Supported by the National Sheriff's Association since 1972, the Neighborhood Watch Program is helping the public eradicate residential crime in their neighborhoods.

Also called Crime Watch, Block Watch, or Community Watch, the program's success is based on the commitment of the public and their local police department in Arizona to work together to observe, report and dissuade crime in their communities. Residents not only take care of their own homes and businesses, but also those of their neighbors. By taking an active role in the protection of their families and possessions, residents are better able to discourage criminal activity and keep their neighborhoods safe.

Each street in the community needs to have a Block Watch Captain. We do have an active Neighborhood Block Watch group on EL Moro. COMMUNITY REMINDERS

Just a few reminders that will help keep our community safe and beautiful!

Please keep the rocks from your yard swept off of your driveway and the sidewalks! It is a safety issue when the rocks are on the sidewalk and it detracts from the maintenance of our community.





Smokers— if you smoke in your yard, please put the butts in a container and refrain from tossing them onto the ground or street. It could be a fire hazard, a health hazard, and the butts are just plain ugly lying on the ground.

Dog Lovers— Please Keep your dogs from pooping in the common area and neighbors yards. If your dog needs a place to poop—why not use your own yard? What a surprise it is to step in a squishy mess—a surprise that most of us wouldn't like to have.

Please scoop the poop!!!!





Please keep your dogs on a leash. It's not only a rule in our CC&R"s, a Law! All dogs must be kept on a leash when outside of fenced area. If you see dogs running loose in the community, streets or in the common area, please call Animal Control and they will come and remove the dogs.

Weeds, Weeds: Please keep your weeds under control. With the monsoons coming, weeds will sprout up quickly. If one yard has weeds, then those weed seeds spread quickly to neighboring yard.





The Call Box at the main gate has been replaced at a cost of \$1400.00, and the lock on the Pedestrian Gate on Pueblo has been fixed. If you see any suspicious activity around the gate immediately call the police. If you know who the vandals are—please let the police and Preferred Communities know. We want the vandals to pay for any repairs—not the community! The Board has authorized a \$500.00 reward for anyone has information that assists in the apprehension those who vandalize our property.



Please remember that there is NO PARKING in front of Fire Hydrants. The City Code states that there is no parking within 15 Feet of a fire hydrant. If your vehicle is parked in front of a fire hydrant, it may be towed, at your expense.



Abandoned, Inoperable, or expired/unlicensed vehicles are not allowed to be parked on the street or in your driveway. If an one of these vehicles is parked on the street, the vehicle may be towed at the owners expense.
